

THE MINISTER'S LETTER

My dear friends,

Well, Christmas and the New Year are over, and, on a personal note, our reaction here at the Manse is "Thank goodness for that!" The month of December, up to Christmas Day, was a pretty positive one, with congregations up, great celebrations, and a sense that we were properly observing the wonderful news of our Saviour's birth.

But after that, for us, things went downhill with one fashionable bug after another making our lives pretty miserable. In fact, we had to cancel the New Year's Manse party for the first time in 14 years: we felt pretty bad about that, and want to say sorry to those who like us were looking forward to it.



But that's all over, and in our Church Meeting on 12th January I laid out an exciting new 3-year programme launched by the URC nationally. It's called *Vision4Life*, and you will hear much more about it over the next few months, and see information inserted into the weekly notice sheet from time to time. But here's a brief overview of the programme.

- in November 2008 we will be looking at ways of studying the Bible together. This will last the whole of the year, until,
- in November 2009 we move onto new ways of prayer individually and with others, and finally
- in November 2010 we will be equipped to 'move out' of the safety of the church with the Gospel. THIS DOES NOT MEAN STANDING ON STREET CORNERS OR ON DOORSTEPS WITH A MESSAGE! It will mean, rather, that by now we will be equipped to speak of our faith to others.

If all that's slightly scary, or if it seems to mean that we might be challenged to do things we are not used to doing – well, that's good. But if it causes you and me to move away from the idea of church being a slightly respectable, warm and fuzzy Sunday club – well, that's good too.

I'm seventy years old this year, sometimes tired, sometimes jaded, and often wonder where Our Lord is leading the Church – and whether we can hear His voice anyway!

But even I am excited by Vision4Life, and I invite you to join me as we eagerly look forward to what is being planned.

Because I'm convinced, with George Rawson the 19th Century hymn writer that

The Lord hath yet more light and truth
To break forth from His Word.

May that Lord bless us all as we explore that Word together, in study, in prayer and in reaching out!

And, oh yes, a very happy New Year to you all!

MAKING PANCAKES



Six year-old Brandon decided one Saturday morning to fix his parents pancakes. He found a big bowl and spoon, pulled a chair to the counter, opened the cupboard and pulled out the heavy flour canister, spilling it on the floor.

He scooped some of the flour into the bowl with his hands, mixed in most of a cup of milk and added some sugar, leaving a floury trail on the floor which by now had a few tracks left by his kitten.

Brandon was covered with flour and getting frustrated. He wanted this to be something very good for Mum and Dad, but it was getting very bad. He didn't know what to do next, whether to put it all into the oven or on the stove and he didn't know how the stove worked!. Suddenly he saw his kitten licking from the bowl of mix and reached to push her away, knocking the egg carton to the floor.

Frantically he tried to clean up this monumental mess but slipped on the eggs, getting his pyjamas white and sticky.

And just then he saw Dad standing at the door. Big crocodile tears welled up in Brandon's eyes. All he'd wanted to do was something good, but he'd made a terrible mess. He was sure a scolding was coming, maybe even a spanking. But his father just watched him.

Then, walking through the mess, he picked up his crying son, hugged him and loved him, getting his own pajamas white and sticky in the process!

That's how God deals with us. We try to do something good in life, but it turns into a mess. Our marriage gets all sticky or we insult a friend, or we can't stand our job, or our health goes sour.

Sometimes we just stand there in tears because we can't think of anything else to do. That's when God picks us up and loves us and forgives us, even though some of our mess gets all over Him.

But just because we might mess up, we can't stop trying to 'make pancakes' for God or for others. Sooner or later we'll get it right, and then they'll be glad we tried...

I was thinking, and I wondered if I had any wounds needing to be healed, friendships that need rekindling or three words needing to be said, sometimes, 'I love you' can heal and bless! Remind every one of your friends that you love them. Even if you think they don't love back, you would be amazed at what those three little words, a smile, and a reminder like this can do.





Finding your star...

The story of the wise men has remained one of my favourite Bible stories. It tells of some magi (aka stargazers, wise men) in the Middle East who decided to abandon their comfortable lives in pursuit of a new star that had appeared in the sky, with the crazy notion that it would lead them to the future king of the Jews. No doubt, they became the butt of the jokes among their peers. One could imagine the bantering that might have gone on in their circle of friends, 'Are you guys nuts or what?' 'Why would anyone in their right mind set out on such a foolish endeavour?' 'Why risk one's life or reputation for some unproven theory?' Why?

Nevertheless, a small band of them stuck to their guns and set off on the epic journey, convinced that they were going to find what they were looking for. For within their hearts laid a hunger, a need, a drive for the "more" and the unknown star represented a call from heaven to follow and to seek. They were prepared to leave behind all the conveniences their wealth, status and success had to offer and embarked on a road that risked everything. Though the journey was long and painful, even dangerous at times, what kept them going was their call: the star that travelled before them.

Imagine their excitement and joy when the star stopped over Jerusalem. Alas, they have arrived! Armed with their gifts, they headed for the palace, their hearts bursting with anticipation and hope of seeing the new born king who would bring about a new world. Much to their surprise, there weren't any joyous celebration; instead, there were only lies, insincerity and deception. They had to endure a steely interrogation by King Herod, who was beside himself with rage and jealousy.

The small band of travellers must have left the palace feeling confused and dejected. Have they made a terrible mistake? Have all their efforts turned to nothing? What would their peers back home think of them now? They must have felt such fools! With King Herod's instructions ringing in their ears, they saddled up and headed for Bethlehem to search for this controversial and mysterious child.

What kind of child should they be looking for now? Besides, what is in the small and insignificant town of Bethlehem?

As they set off with heavy hearts, the star above began to move ahead of them once more and it eventually stopped over a house. This time, with much apprehension and caution, they entered the house and saw the child with his mother. Suddenly, something happened deep within them and they knew in their heart of hearts that they have found what they were looking for. They have discovered the "more" in what seemed so little, so poor, so insignificant. The call from heaven gave them new hearts and minds. And they knelt down before the child in worship and adoration, and presented their gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh. They gave the best they had.

When they were ready to head for home, they were told in a dream not to return to Herod so they took a different route home. After what they had been through, what they had seen and experienced, their lives would never be the same again.

The story of the *magi* is also our story. Like them, to be attentive to our own call, to hunger for the "more" and to remain faithful in our struggles are part of our life's journey. Like them, we too can find the wisdom and power of God in the weak, the poor, the vulnerable and the lowly. We, too, can never be the same again.

This is a story of conversion, of our search, sometimes in the midst of plenty and the call to find our own star, to travel by a different road and finally never to be the same again.
